Having worked in Ilfracombe pubs for many years, Nick Walters is a well known and popular landlord. While at the **Ship and Pilot** he steered the pub to numerous awards, not least that of CAMRA branch Pub of the Year in both 2012 and 2014 together with at least 6 successive entries in the Good Beer Guide! Now with the opening of the nearby **Hip and Pistol**, Nick



has at last realised his lifelong ambition to be landlord and owner of his very own pub! This former Tea Room has been transformed into a unique venue, decorated

with Nick's own quirky take on the nautical theme. Check out the floor which depicts the bay around Ilfracombe, pinpointing interesting landmarks and shipwreck sites. Having myself scuba dived around this coast I know just what a talking point the floor has become!

Opened only a few months ago, the Hip and Pistol has quickly become a popular haunt for locals and visitors alike, attracting CAMRA members from near and far. There are usually four real ales on offer, two of which are always local, plus an ever growing number of real ciders, the quality of which is never short of Nick's very high standard. Serving excellent yet reasonably priced Pub Food prepared by a talented local chef is yet another reason to check out this destination pub.

Talking to Nick it soon becomes evident that although from the North of England, since arriving in Ilfracombe he has fully embraced the town and everything about it, describing it as his ideal place to live. Community spirit has always been important to Nick, involving himself and his customers in many local community and fund raising events over the years - fancy dress and live music being just two of their hallmarks. Knowing Nick, this is sure to continue at the Hip and Pistol, as seen by the recent themed

event at the pub which raised over £500 for llfracombe Boxing Club funds.

environment is another of Nick's passions, SO great surprise that one Sunday each month there's collection а and recycling event, organised resourced by the pub, to clear plastic and other litter from local beaches. scheme has



already expanded to clearing up other public places in the town, and as such has attracted considerable media interest both local and national. The collected waste is either then recycled or incinerated to generate clean energy in partnership with Coastal Recycling. It's certainly been a very busy Spring for North Devon CAMRA as far as branch activities go, with a wide variety of social events to match every taste. In late February there was a celebratory lunch at the **Portsmouth Arms** to mark the successful conclusion of discussions with



the Devon and Cornwall Rail Partnership to add additional stops to their normal Sunday service on the Tarka line between Barnstaple and Exeter, Rail executives were invited and regional colleagues from CAMRA were enlisted to lend support. Unfortunately, in the event, with a welcome committee and photographer stood on the platform eagerly awaiting the arrival of the VIPs on this inaugural run - the driver forgot to stop the train! But all was not lost. Passengers were able to disembark at the next station where taxis were hastily summoned to return travelers to the pub by which time, suitably embarrassed, the driver had phoned through to buy a pint for everyone who had been inconvenienced. Proper job!

March saw the return of a popular branch activity - tutored beer tasting at the **Reform Inn** in Pilton. Conducted by Tim Webster from the Barum brewery, members were introduced to the delights of no less than 5 different local ales (Barum's own Breakfast, Original and Best, plus Country Life's Golden Pig and Board Break), all of which of course were served in excellent form. March also saw our branch AGM at the **Ebrington Arms** in Knowle, where some excellent ales were consumed amid the usual business of electing officers for the

coming year, while the following week a large contingent of branch members also managed to attend the much celebrated Beer Festival at the **Wellington Arms** (the **Welly**) in Ilfracombe. From the 15 Devon ales on tap, *Hanlon's Yellow Hammer* and *GT Ales Thirst of Many* proved to be the best sellers. This popular event is now to become a regular Easter feature. Oh! - and let's not forget the enjoyable afternoon and evening spent at the **Yeoford Ale Festival** held annually in the splendid village hall - this year with no less than 25 real ales on offer!

April saw the North Devon Pub of the Year award presented to Mark and staff at the Bell in Chittlehampton, the first of several branch awards to be presented this year. In May it was the turn of the Cyder Presse at Weare Gifford to receive their award for Cider Pub of the Year, with the Bideford Conservative Club picking up the gong for the branch Club of the Year. Ever popular in the branch calendar, a brewery visit is always something special, and for the 12 plucky branch members this visit to the **Teignworthy brewery** at Newton Abbot certainly lived up to expectations. With both *Beachcomer* and *Gun Dog* on tap, and a sumptuous lunch to follow, what better way to complete the day but with a visit to the nearby **Teign Cellars** - once part of the Newton Abbott workhouse but now home to no less than 170 bottled beers plus the brewery's 5 real ales. (And for several members

there was a swift return to Newton Abbot later in the month - but this time as volunteer bar staff at the famed **Tuckers Maltings** beer festival where work behind the bar earns much needed income each year for the branch coffers).





## **Pub News**from around the Branch



With so many reports these days of pubs closing down across the country, it's always heartening to hear news of North Devon pubs re-opening after a period of closure. The Stag at Rackenford was relaunched in March, while at Westward Ho! the Beach Bar and Diner re-opened in April after a six month closure, sporting a new conservatory and now with Wadsworth IPA reported to be on sale. In Okehampton, the Plume of Feathers is now back in business, with landlord Steve stocking four well kept ales from the cask in addition to at least two craft beers on tap. Similarly in Ilfracombe the former Lamb Inn is now operating as the 'Thomas Carr Seafood and Bar Grill' offering two real ales with the promise of more in the up-market ground floor pub, while the beautifully restored Victorian dining room upstairs promises customers a fine dining experience.

So too in the near future can we look forward to the re-birth of several more much missed pubs which for one reason or another have endured extended periods of closure in recent times. Foremost amongst these is the **Bell** at Parkham, rising like a phoenix from the ashes after last year's devastating fire and now scheduled for an August re-opening, while the **Farmers Arms** at Woolsery is almost fully restored after being rescued from oblivion by the Bebo tech co-founder Michael Birch. Although less well advanced, major restoration work is also in evidence at both the **Boathouse** in Instow and



the **Royal George** at Appledore, and we look forward to seeing all these once great pubs back fully operational before long.

Meanwhile, there's evidence of several other local pubs investing heavily in improvements designed to attract the discerning customer.

These include the **Appledore** Inn at Bideford and the **Village** Inn at Westward Ho!, both now fully operational following major



kitchen refurbishments. The **Westleigh Inn** also has a new look about it, with a smart block paving patio and covered smoking area, while



the car park has been leveled and stoned. At the **Jack Russell** in Swimbridge it's almost back to business as usual after February's devastating flood, and although still unable to offer food at the time of writing, they do at least have a functioning bar even

if it is having to operate out of the skittle alley! News too of the **Wizard brewery** in Ilfracombe, now under new ownership, and thankfully once more selling Lundy Gold and Druid's Fluid at the **Pier Tap and Grill.** 

On a less positive note unfortunately, following the recent sale of the **Hartland Inn** by auction, all signs that this was once a pub have since disappeared. Ominously, the **Plymouth Inn** at Okehampton now has a 'sold' sign outside, but what this means we await to see. Likewise the **Exeter Inn** at Chittlehamholt has closed its doors, though the reason is not yet clear, while the **Rising Sun** at Umberleigh is also reported to have closed.



Finally, a note of welcome to some new licensees. At the Ram's Head in Dolton we now have Nico and

Vanessa who have recently relocated from the Vendee region of France, while Malcolm and Wendy McHugh from Co Tipperary have taken charge of the **Old Smithy** at Welcome - be sure to check out their upcoming Beer Festival planned for the 14th and 15th July!

#### **STOP PRESS!**

One of the most iconic pubs in the area - the **Hunters Inn** at Heddon Valley on the Exmoor coast - is to be taken over by the National Trust and managed by Bespoke Hotels on their behalf. Let's just hope that their tradition of excellent ales is maintained by the new management.

## CAMRA Compliance with General Data Protection Act



#### WHAT IT MEANS TO YOU

As from 25<sup>th</sup> May this year the new General Data Protection Regulations 2016 superseded the Data Protection Act 1998. Like all other organisations, CAMRA has been required to review and update the ways in which the personal data of individuals is held.

CAMRA has been working on compliance with its dedicated Data Protection Officer for a number of years. This has enabled CAMRA to be fully prepared for the new legislation in time for the 25<sup>th</sup> May deadline. Existing processes have been reviewed, a new privacy policy has been put in place, internal communication tools modified and, perhaps most significantly, a new member preferences system has been developed.

CAMRA members now have the opportunity to take more control of their data by telling us exactly what they want to hear about the Campaign by easily updating their preferences on-line. This means fewer e-mails and letters

about issues that aren't relevant to you, and better, more streamlined communication in those areas that are of interest.

Members may remember seeing an explanatory e-mail about this from our National Chairman, Jackie Parker, in April and no doubt many members have already expressed their preferences accordingly. If however, you have not yet done so, then it really is quite easy to do: Simply sign in to your account using your membership details at www.camra.org.uk

Select "Edit your membership information" to update your membership information and decide exactly what you want from CAMRA.

## The Wizard is Back!

New owner Carly O'Callaghan was persuaded by her husband John to take on the brewery to fulfill her lifetime ambition to become a Brewer. A longtime amateur brewer and lover of real ale, Carly has recently undertaken professional training to take her skills to the next level.

Having purchased the brewery with rights to all the previous recipes, Carly began with a few test batches but the brewery is now fully operational. This has resulted in both **Lundy Gold** and **Druids Fluid** being sold in four pubs in the local area. With initial feedback being very positive, the next batches are already in production. We have however been asked to emphasize that the new Wizard brewery has no connection whatsoever to the previous owners. The intention is to replicate the beers as offered by the original founder of Wizard and restore the brewery's good name and fortunes.



No stranger to hard graft, Carly has previously worked as a herdswoman, helping milk 550 cows on a daily basis! So when new branch chairman Mark Partridge and myself visited it was no surprise to see the evidence of a great deal of hard work with everything looking spic and span and ready for business. Assisted by husband John, Carly has a sound business plan,

intending first to consolidate production around the two ales now being produced before slowly introducing other beers as sales expand. Bottled beers and small batch containers could also be next on the agenda.

Whilst still early days, Mark and I saw enough to convince us that Carly is likely to succeed with her plans and is certainly to be commended for her level headed approach to this ambitious enterprise. We look forward to reporting back on Wizard's progress in future editions of Beer Tiz. Hopefully in the not too distant future there will be an opportunity for a CAMRA members' tasting session, but in the meantime, if you see Wizard beers on offer, I recommend you give them a try. Carly has restarted the magic - and the Wizard is truly back!


